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Chorioretinal coloboma

Chorioretinal colobomas are caused by failure of the embryonic fissure to close during development. They have a yellow-white appearance, often with hyperpigmented margins. They are most common in the inferonasal quadrant and may be associated with colobomas of the iris and optic nerve.
